Described as a new concept in 3-D radar, Martello will be in production by 1980 and is designed to provide complete air defence coverage throughout the 1980's and 1990's.



A significant technological breakthrough has led us to the realisation of a new surveillance radar geared to the military threat which can be expected over the next 15 years or so.

"Martello has a vast potential market over this period. We have devoted very considerable private venture investment to the project and are well satisfied with the result"



RELATIONS IN INDUSTRY

I am taking the opportunity in this editorial to set down my personal views on the vexed subject of industrial relations.

The Company's concern, and my own concern, is for the well-being of all the members of the Company, for the total workforce, but not for one particular group at the expense of another. Looking at the industrial relationship scene in general, what is deplorable across major parts of British industry today is the way in which small groups of people will seek to damage the unit in which they work (be it private company, publically owned establishment or Local Government) for apparently the most trivial of reasons.

This might perhaps be understandable if not excusable in formerly labour intensive industries, such as the docks where

capital investment has been low and employment declining. But to see the practice spreading to healthy industries with a great future is disheartening not only to professional managers but many well-meaning people at all levels in those industries. Far from creating a better environment and conditions, it is inhibiting output, and therefore slowing down revenue, and sapping the very means by which employment can be improved in every way. Precipitate and selfish action can only damage everyone in an enterprise as a whole, both short and long-term.

In companies in high technology markets, making big investments in plant and facilities, research and development, and training the new generation, there should be no neec for thoughtless industrial action; if normal channels of communication and negotiation need improvement, then this surely can be done by sensibly sitting round a table, and not by action actually calculated to damage the enterprise by which all its employees gain their livelihood.

Sir Robert Telford

AS WE announced in the Stop Press column of our last issue, Robert Telford, CBE.,MA (Cantab), F.Eng., FIEE., FI Prod.E., F3IM., FRSA., Managing Director of GEC-Marconi Electronics, has been knighted in the Queen's Birthday Honours List for his services to export.

Sir Robert was born in Liverpool in 1915. He was educated at Quarry Bank High School, Liverpool, Queen Elizabeth's Gram-

mar School, Tamworth, and Christ's College,

Cambridge (1934-37).

He joined Marconi's as a trainee in 1937. At the end of his two year apprenticeship, much of which was spent on the shop-floor, he became Assistant to the Works Manager in Chelmsford. From 1940-46 he was Manager of Marconi's Hackbridge Works, responsible amongst other equipments, for the production of the well-known T1154/R1155 transmitter/receivers for the R.A.F. At the end of the war he became Managing Director of Marconi's Brazilian Company, a post he held for four years, returning to England in 1950 when he was appointed Assistant to the General Manager.

In 1953 he became General Works Manager responsible for all Marconi Factories. Five years later he was appointed General Manager, a position he held for seven years until becoming Managing Director of The Marconi Company in 1965 and a Director of English Electric in 1968.

Following the mergers of various companies Sir Robert became Managing Director of GEC-Marconi Electronics Limited, the company which manages the electronics interests of The General Electric Company. He became a Director of GEC in 1973 and, among other companies, he is also a director of the Canadian Marconi Company and Svenska Radio (which is now known as SRA Communications AB).

Under Sir Robert's guidance, the GEC-Marconi Electronics group's overseas sales have gone from some £18 million in 1968 to a massive total of over £230 million, and, since 1966, the Group has been awarded 19 Queen's Awards of which 11 were for Export.

Among his many extramural activities he has been a Group Chairman of the Duke of Edinburgh's Conference on Human Problems

in Industrial Communities. He is a past Chairman of the Electronic Engineering Association and he is a member of the Engineering Industry Training Board.


Sir Robert is married and lives in Rettendon, near Chelmsford.



WE CONCLUDE our series of articles on the Company's outlying locations by turning the spotlight in this issue on to our Stoughton Test Site.


This three-acre site is situated some 450 feet above sea level near the village of Stoughton, a few miles from Leicester It is, in fact, part of Leicester East Airfield — the headquarters of Leicestershire Aero Club — which was used by the R.A.F during the last war. The Company took over at Stoughton in 1960, having previously used a test site in Anstey Lane at Leicester.



Field tests for overall performance of radar equipment are carried out at the site, which has some 1200 square yards of covered space. Three towers are used for accurate antenna alignment, and trials with balloons and aircraft can also be undertaken.

Site Manager Peter Robinson looks after day-to-day administration, and Peter Lewis, Assistant Manager, Field Services, is responsible for the site on behalf of Support Division.

Charlie Capon is Systems Manager for GWS25 on the site; Ray Critchley, with a team from Blackbird Road, is Test Engineer for 909; Tony Gill is responsible for the 909 Production Reference Model; and Eric Downs, of Contracts Department, for Type 85 equipment.




The Marconi Radar boat took part in five main races and acquitted itself well among some tough opposition from the experienced Australians, New Zealanders and other overseas competitors.
