The naval connection

THE pictures in this edition of ECHO underline the strong links between Marconi Radar and the Royal Navy and other navies overseas.

We provide virtually all the radars for the ships of the Fleet and we have recently been discussing programmes of development and production of naval equipment for the Ministry of Defence stretching well into the nineteen eighties.

You will all have seen pictures of the SEA DART radar at Leicester and the SEAWOLF radars at Chelmsford, and many of us in the Company have worked on these projects. These are

the key elements of two superlative weapon systems which will be protecting the ships of the Royal Navy against attack for many years to come.

Advanced

We are also developing, and will soon be producing for the Navy a very advanced new surveillance radar system which will give the earliest possible warning of the approach of a potential enemy.

It will be built as a 'family' of radars from which just the right combination of units can be chosen to fit the requirements of each class of warship.

Orders

The radars for the Royal Navy have been developed under contracts from the Ministry of Defence. In parallel, we have been investing Marconi Radar's own money in the design of a range of 'private venture' radars aimed at weapon systems for smaller vessels, and we have already won orders valued at over thirty million pounds for these equipments as part of the export business of British shipyards.

We can all take pride in our achievement in the naval field, and can enjoy the close association we have built up both with the Royal Navy and with foreign navies who look to us for

their defence.

SPOTLIGHT ON NORWICH

A close look at one of our newest outposts...

WE continue our review of the Company's outlying locations by turning the spotlight in this issue on to one of our youngest outposts — an extension of our Technical Information Department which was established at Norwich in November 1973.

The office was opened at Queen's Road with a locally-recruited staff of 17 — mainly technical authors but including some drawing office staff — under the overall supervision of T.I.D. Manager Ken Stoker, Support Division, Chelmsford. Managing 'on the spot' at Norwich is Chief Author Doug Clarke, formerly of Writtle Road.

As the Company's order book continues to grow, so more technical publications are required. In September of last year the Queen's Road staff, which had grown to 30, moved to new and more spacious premises at St. Peter's House, Cattle Market Street. At present they



 Artist's impression of a 46-metre Vosper Fast Patrol Boat fitted with Marconi S810 and ST802 radar systems.



About half of this work is Government-sponsored and weighted towards naval equipment, while the other half consists of private venture development of new products and updating existing ones.

Lightweight

One of the Company's major private venture developments has been a range of lightweight radars, the 800 series. This is the basis of many modern weapon systems for the small naval vessels — fast patrol boats, corvettes and frigates — and also finds application in ground fire control systems. Sales of the 800 series at home and overseas already amount to over £30 million.

Many people throughout the Company — at Chelmsford, Leicester, Gateshead or other locations — are involved in the development and production of 800 series radars, and on these pages we show some of them at work.





ONCE HOME at the end of the working day after supervising the development of Marconi TEPIGEN (Television Picture Generator) at New Parks, Terry Rowley, Chief Engineer Computer Applications, will more likely than not turn his hand to creating pictures of a very different kind.

Entirely self-taught and with no formal training, Terry has mastered the technique of engraving intricate designs on glass. He already has more than 20 finished items to his credit, ranging from brass rubbing designs on window panes to delicate engravings on crystal goblets and glasses.

Terry's graduation from window panes to the more delicate crystal pieces came after seeing the work of Lawrence Whistler, considered to be the greatest living glass engraver. Terry joined the Glass Engravers Guild so that he could compare notes with other engravers, and soon many people who saw his work were commissioning items of glassware for special presents.

"The West Midlands is famous for its crystal production and so good glass is easy to obtain in this area," says Terry. "I still have a lot to learn, but I find that as more people request special designs, such as holiday views and favourite pets, so my technique is improving all the time.

"The engraving on crystal is done with a hand-held diamond mounted in a holder. The technique is to tap the glass with the diamond to form little spots, or to scratch it for lines. The average piece takes me about four or five hours to complete, but I find it an absorbing hobby and an ideal form of relaxation."
